




CREDIT BY ATTENDANCE²

DEMOGRAPHICS OF STUDENTS ENROLLED FOR CREDIT²




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

Academic Senate

The Academic Senate's primary function is to make recommendations with respect to academic and professional matters.



Associated Students

PCC's student body consisting of 12 current students that are elected annually to represent and work for the students.



Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees governs the Pasadena Area Community College District and serves as the policyforming body of the District.



Classified Senate

Represents all Classified Staff through the Pasadena Area Community College District in matters of shared governance.



College Council

A forum where representatives from all segments of the college bring issues of collegewide interest.



Council on Academic & Professional Matters

Attempts to achieve mutual agreement between the Academic Senate and the Board of Trustees on academic & professional matters.



Management Association

The mechanism through which the deans, managers and supervisors of the college participate in shared governance.



Overview

The Board of Trustees is committed to a participatory governance system which enusures "faculty, staff and students the right to participate effectively in district and college governance and the opportunity to express their opinions at the [district] level and to ensure that these opinions are given every reasonable consideration, and the right of academic senates to assume primary responsibility for making recommendations in areas of curriculum and academic standards" (Education Code Section 70901).

In order to provide an opportunity for students, staff, and faculty to participate effectively in District governance, the Board of Trustees of the San Mateo County Community College District hereby establishes a District Participatory Governance Council (DPGC).

The District Participatory Governance Council operates in a climate of collegiality and trust, making its recommendations on a consensus-building basis. Consensus building involves polling of appointed members to determine if consensus has been reached. The Council is governed by the Board Policy (Rules and Regulations 2.09 🖒) and the Brown Act.


Institutional Planning and Governance Guide

ACADEMIC SENATE

for California Community Colleges

Title 5 §53200 (b): Academic Senate means an organization whose primary function is to make recommendations with respect to academic and professional matters. In Section 53200 (c), "Academic and professional matters" means the following policy development and implementation matters:

- Curriculum including establishing prerequisites and placing courses within disciplines
- Degree and certificate requirements
- Grading policies
- 4 Educational program development
- 5 Standards or policies regarding student preparation and success
- 6 District and college governance structures, as related to faculty roles
- Faculty roles and involvement in accreditation processes, including self-study and annual reports
- Policies for faculty professional development activities
- Processes for program review
- Processes for institutional planning and budget development
- Other academic and professional matters as are mutually agreed upon between the governing board and the academic senate.

§ 51023.7. Students.

- (a) The governing board of a community college district shall adopt policies and procedures that provide students the opportunity to participate effectively in district and college governance. Among other matters, said policies and procedures shall include the following:
- (1) Students shall be provided an opportunity to participate in formulation and development of district and college policies and procedures that have or will have a significant effect on students. This right includes the opportunity to participate in processes for jointly developing recommendations to the governing board regarding such policies and procedures.

Group Exercise #2

At Meerkat College the student government has passed a resolution to create a once a month "College Hour". They have proposed that no classes be scheduled for a period of 90 minutes once a month. They are proposing Wednesdays 12-1:30 PM.

They bring the proposal to the College Cabinet, make their presentation and are greeted with very negative feedback which includes, we already tried that, we can't cancel classes once a month, you can just arrange your schedules, and more.

You are the in the Office of Student Affairs and need to support the students, but also need to guide them through this effort. What are your first steps?

Leadership for Racial Equity

- Personal Experience Educational and professional backgrounds influence our decisions.
- **Knowledge** Understanding the data/research; reading important reports/documents; asking the right questions; and if you don't know the answer, asking for clarification.
- Clear Vision Having a vision for where you want your college/institution will be in the future.

Leadership for Racial Equity

- **Building Support** Identifying individuals to work with you; then those individuals are involved in the development; and they maintain their involvement in the work.
- Staying Focused Focus on what matters, which is -- Student Success.
- Using Data to Support Decision Making Don't make decisions on the fly that impact student success.
- **Build Capacity** Support all levels within your program/department and at your institutions.

Leadership for Racial Equity

- Partnerships Establish and maintain partnerships with schools, colleges, universities, businesses, community-based organizations, and county agencies to respond to the educational, workforce training, and economic development needs.
- Opportunity Seize the moment and recognize the opportunities that will transform our institutions in support of student success.
- Never Give Up If we don't support and advocate for our students and our institutions, who will?
